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A Letter from the Health Officer:

Dear Colleagues, Partners, and Friends,

It has been another year of hard work and perseverance from the Bernards Township Health Department (BTHD). We are pleased to present our efforts through the **2022 Annual Report**. Throughout the pages of this document, you'll be able to capture the zeal of our talented staff and their everyday work. Even during one of the deadliest pandemics of our time, our goal to each of our municipalities remains the same to provide the best public health services and protect the health of all residents within Bernards Township, Bernardsville Borough, Peapack and Gladstone Borough (Somerset County) and Chester Borough, Mendham Borough, and Long Hill Township (Morris County).

What we do in public health is complex, challenging, and always changing. It's hard to believe that our department has been working on COVID-19 for nearly three years now. Despite fading from the media coverage from time to time, there has been a continued need for our expertise in our COVID response. We have been able to reliably provide COVID-19 testing clinics with partners at WellCare. We also administered COVID-19 vaccinations using our BT nurse and contracted Atlantic Visiting Nurses at the COVID-19 immunization clinics. We not only administered new COVID-19 Omicron bivalent boosters but responded to the emergence of Mpox and the threat of Ebola.

This past year of 2022 has been a year full of grant applications and we are just beginning to reap the rewards from our diligent work. The Strengthening Local Public Health Capacity Program has added full and part-time personnel to our staff and provides funding to strengthen outbreak preparedness and response capacity. Several staff members have been trained through the state funded Project Firstline to help educate community partners in infection control. We saw an increase in our prevention grants which help provide programming geared towards youth services, substance misuse and mental health. Other grant programs include radon testing and City Dashboard. These funds have streamlined our ability to provide effective prevention programs to our municipalities.

As always, the health department consistently meets all requirements of Chapter 52 *(Public Health Practice Standards for Local Boards of Health* and continues to return to many of the pre-pandemic practices. Our diverse workforce balances an insurmountable workload of field inspections, vital statistic record keeping, animal control services and health education programming. Our office has returned to disseminating the monthly "HEALTH MATTERS" E-Newsletter to our residents. Through HEALTH MATTERS we not only continue to provide COVID-19 related updates, but also include pertinent public health information and upcoming BTHD programs. While many of these programs are still offered as convenient virtual programming, we safely returned to in-person health education programs such as "Fight Inflammation: The Power of Food" and many others as we move into 2023. We would like to thank each of our Boards of Health members, including the Bernards Township Board of Health President Dr. John Salaki for their support of the health department team.

We at the BTHD remain vigilant and consistent with our responsibilities to our municipalities. Our hope is that this report offers a glimpse of the hard work our staff has accomplished this year. A continued thank you also goes to all our municipal partners for putting their trust in us. We have seen how strong community partnership can mitigate the spread of communicable disease and impact the prevalence of chronic illness. We look forward to continuing to serve your town and beyond to provide effective programming and impeccable amenities for years to come.


- A single little brown bat can eat 1200 mosquitoes in an hour • The little brown bat is the world's longest lived mammal for its size with a lifespan over 32
- vears. . In October and November, the bats leave their summer roost and move to caves to
- hibernale for the winter. This is the best time to bat proof your house. · Bats prepare for hibernation by putting on fat to last through the cold winter.
- · Bals emerge again in April and May returning to the same location through their entire lifetime.
- · Young bats (pups) are born in June or July and are fully grown within four weeks.
- The only way to keep a house free of bats is to block up the opening the bats are using.
- It is illegal for anyone, including animal control officers and exterminators, to kill bats. All evictions or exclusions should take place prior to mid-May or after mid-September to
- be sure the young are ready to fly.
- · If a colony of bats is to be removed from a home, attic or barn, another place for the bats to roost such as a bat house should be considered.

All mammals, including bats, can get rabies, however less than one percent of all bats are infected with the virus. Just remember, NEVER handle a bat! If you are accidentally bitten or exposed, such as direct (bare skin) contact with a bat, make sure the bat is saved for examination. Immediately wash with soap and water and seek prompt medical advice and report to your local Animal Control services for assistance.



Important COVID-19 Update from Bernards Township Health Officer, Lucy Forgione

Since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Bernards Township Health Department has done their part to respond and portect the municipalities within their jurisdictions. At the helm of effort is Health Officer/Director of Health, Lucy A Forgione. Spanning nearly 4 decades Forgiones career has seen its fair shore of public health events including HIN, Ebola, and Zika but nathing quite like the COVID-19 pandemic. Throughout the past 2.5 years the world has been introduced to not only a novel coronavirus, but several mutations and variants that have caused a significant rise in cases worldwide. Summer and fall 2021, the Delta variant caused a spike in cases, and starting at the end of November 2021 Omicron began its reign as the dominant variant.

In the United States, it would appear as though COVID is on a decline, but BA4 and BA5 have begun to change that, says Forgiane. As of the most recent. New Jersey COVID-19 Variant Surveillance Report, BA4 makes up 43.6%, According to the Centers for Disease Control COVID Data Tracker, BA4 makes up 12.9% while BA5 makes up 81.9% of cases. The earliest strains of the Omicron variant seemed to have faded to make way for BA4 and BA5. Why is this? "Mobility is increasing while mask wearing declines", says Forgiane. 'Vaocimes are less effective at preventing infection from BA4 and BA5 with how much this virus has changed.' It also capears as though previous infection from COVID-19 isnt providing immunity the same way it used to. Reinfection is also on the rise.

Other challenges include more people using at-home tests when they're sick and not reporting cases to public health authorities. Your case counts end up being inaccurate and we are unoble to offer public health advice and guidance to those who are sick.



Forgione encourages the public to still have faith in their vaccines and boosters at the moment. "Although the vaccines are less effective at preventing intection from the newer variants, they are still very effective in preventing severe liness and montality. Vaccines are more readily available tor various age groups and boosters are also able to protect those in vunerable age groups. Anti-virals and abter therapeutics are also available to those who are infected with COVID-19 including Pavlovid. We are more equipped now to actives a surge than we were earlier in this pandemic' says proglane. As for tips to stay as healithy as possible this summer? 'Get your booster shot if it's available places, wash your honds and stay home if you're sick. We are prepared and ready. Stay well and well all be on the other side of this one day'.

The New Jersey Department of Health -(NJDOH) Office of Local Public Health (OLPH) Strengthening Local Public Health Capacity Program

- The Strengthening Local Public Health Capacity Program is a non-competitive grant funding opportunity offered to all eligible non-LINCS Agency local health departments (LHDs) to boost public health capacity during COVID-19 response. Bernards Township Health Department was awarded \$291,042 for the project period 7/1/2021 6/30/2022, as well as an additional \$274,735 for the project period 7/1/2022 6/30/2023.
- Funding categories include:

a). Outbreak Preparedness (OP) to strengthen outbreak preparedness/response capacity by reimbursing eligible COVID-19 and other infectious disease-related expenses - \$34,000 (2021-2022), \$21,606 (2022-2023)

b). Local Health Outreach Coordinator (LHOC) to hire full-time personnel to assess, mitigate and respond to populations disproportionately affected by the social and health impacts of COVID-19 and other infectious diseases - \$140,375 (2021-2022), \$123,529 (2022-2023)

c). Infectious Disease Preparedness Generalist (IDPG) to hire full-time personnel to assist with outreach to populations disproportionately affected by COVID-19 and other infectious diseases, POD planning, logistics, testing and contact tracing, etc. - **\$116,667** (2021-2022), **\$129,600** (2022-2023)

• LHOC Deliverables:

- Managed all program activities and finances of state-funded grant to comply with NJDOH requirements.
- Created and submitted quarterly progress reports encapsulating all program activities during the quarter.
- Assisted the Chief Financial Officer in creating quarterly budget reports for state-funded grant.
- Conducted a community needs assessment to identify and describe at-risk populations in the local community, including census data for each town.
- Communicated with faith-based organizations to provide healthcare resources for underserved populations, specifically those with limited to no health insurance.
- Coordinated a homebound, vaccination program to allow bedridden and disabled community residents to access COVID-19 vaccines in their homes,
- Organized monthly meetings with local LHOCs to collaborate and discuss best practices to help serve at-risk populations in local communities.



- Worked with NJDOH Program and Grant managers to manage state-funded grant.
- Maintained a vulnerable populations email distribution list to disseminate pertinent information to community partners regarding COVID-19 prevention, vaccination, testing, contact tracing, and social support messaging.
- Participated in monthly/quarterly meetings with local stakeholders including faith-based organizations, state/county health departments, LINCS Social Support Coordinators and Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs).

- The COPE (Creating Opportunities for Positive Emotions) Program provides all elementary students in Bernards Township with the opportunity to learn how to cope with difficult emotions as well as the tools necessary to do so.
 - Children in elementary school are just beginning to learn how to identify the emotions that they are experiencing (i.e., happy, sad, angry, worried, overwhelmed).
- COPE provides students with opportunities to learn how to identify and label their emotions as well as how to cope with these feelings.
- Children have access to emotion cards that will assist in emotion identification and coping cards to assist in managing these emotions (i.e., take a deep breath, count to ten, draw a picture, use a fidget, go for a mindful walk in the hallway, think of a happy thought, etc.).
- Through COPE, each classroom in grades kindergarten through fifth grade in Bernards Township would have access to a coping kit. 144 kits total.
- This coping kit includes coping cards, coloring paper, crayons, and a variety of sensory tools to be used when a child is experiencing a heightened emotion within the classroom.
- COPE also provides each Elementary School Counselor with 40 new Social and Emotional Learning related books.
 - Teachers, counselors, and administrators are often looking for books to help teach important lessons on various topics such as: inclusion, making good choices, showing kindness to peers, having tolerance, and accepting differences and managing emotions.
 - Students tend to remember great stories with important life lessons which will help them succeed independently and within their relationships year after year.
