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A Letter from the Health Officer:

Dear Colleagues, Partners, and Friends,

I am pleased to share the Bernards Township Health Department's **2023 Annual Report** with our communities. The work we do in Public Health is challenging, complex, and ever-changing with a constant responsibility of protecting and improving the health and wellbeing of our communities. It is my hope that these pages will capture the essence of the work performed by our talented staff. We are grateful to our community partners and to all residents of Bernards Township, Bernardsville Borough, Peapack and Gladstone Borough (Somerset County) and Chester Borough, Mendham Borough, and Long Hill Township (Morris County). Our goal is to provide the best public health services and protect the health of the residents we serve.

This past year has been full of grant applications, and we are reaping the rewards from our diligent work. The Strengthening Local Public Health Capacity program, COVID-19 Vaccination Supplemental Funding program, and the Enhancing Local Public Health Infrastructure program have provided greater capacity in terms of staffing, national accreditation, outbreak preparedness, response capacity and more. Our department also received a statefunded Project Firstline Grant that was intended to educate community partners in infection control and prevention. In addition, we received the first installment of the Opioid settlement money geared towards youth services, substance misuse and mental health. Other grant programs include radon testing and the City Dashboard, which showcases local data intended to advance health equity. These funds have streamlined our ability to provide effective prevention programs.

All environmental services were in full gear with many lead cases that needed immediate attention and follow-up. The environmental staff completed all inspections of over 425 food establishments and other inspections outlined in this report. Health Education also provided an array of fabulous nutrition, heart-healthy and chronic disease programs. It has been a great year with an excellent team of fine professionals.

We are happy to share the exciting work we are doing. It has been a balancing act of leaving the large volume of COVID-19 work behind while embracing the many public health needs of our communities. In December, we renewed all five (5) Interlocal Public Health Services contracts for an additional three years and contracted with a new Public Health Visiting Nursing services agency, Community VNA in Somerville.

Lastly, it is with a heavy heart and with great joy that I formally write to inform you of my retirement. After 41 wonderful years with the Bernards Township Health Department, I have decided to begin a new adventure in my life. My last day will be March 31, 2024. I loved my life's work and had the pleasure of working with so many talented people throughout the years. I've had the privilege of living in Bernards Township and raising two wonderful young men. This was truly my dream job. I was afforded the opportunities to excel and have many incredible experiences.

Every day was a new day serving our communities, helping so many people while learning so much. Who would have thought that the last few years of my career would have been the ultimate experience, "a global pandemic". I am proud of the fine work my department and I accomplished for all six (6) municipalities within our jurisdiction.

I am grateful for the 41 years of public service and feel honored to have served Bernards Township and the five contracting municipalities. I will look fondly on the support and kindness I received from the Board of Health members and especially Dr. John Salaki, BOH President, Bernards Township Committee, administration, and coworkers.



COVID-19 MANAGEMENT & MITIGATION MONTH BY MONTH

<u>Ianuary</u>

- The Local Health Outreach Coordinator (LHOC) continued to work to identify the vulnerable populations in our jurisdictions and identify gaps to help address the needs of COVID-19 positive and exposed persons:
 - Coordinated homebound vaccinations for individuals who are bedridden and/or disabled
 - Continued to catalog a list of available resources to help vulnerable populations access critical resources such as social services, mental health services, and general healthcare. Also included access to resources like food banks, mental health services, visiting nurses, telehealth solutions, and other community programs
 - Prioritized COVID-19 response initiatives such as weekly COVID-19 testing and vaccination clinics
 - Regularly monitored COVID-19 related data received through testing and contact tracing
 - Worked with other local health department LHOCs in NJ to create collaborative opportunities and resources through monthly meetings
 - Collaborated with local faith-based organizations to implement COVID-19 testing and vaccination clinics in underserved communities, as well as preventative health initiatives

• Vaccination Efforts

- Vaccine clinics were conducted throughout January at Saint James
 Church
- The Health Department offered Pediatric Pfizer (5-11) Bivalent Boosters, Pfizer Bivalent Boosters for 12+ and Moderna Bivalent Boosters for 18+.
- Staff responsibilities for vaccination clinics were continuously discussed as vaccine supply and demand change.
- Clinic supplies have been assessed and prepared to ensure we can continue vaccination efforts. The Public Health Nurse ordered supplies and maintained inventory.
- Contacted volunteers as needed according to skills and vaccine demand. We have utilized licensed medical professional volunteers, as well as Spanish-speaking volunteers.

COPE (Creating Opportunities for Positive Emotions)

Creating Opportunities for Positive Emotions

- Competitive Grant program sponsored by the Youth Services Commission \$4,000. This is Year 2 of the grant.
- The COPE (Creating Opportunities for Positive Emotions) Program provides all elementary students in Bernards Township with the opportunity to learn how to cope with difficult emotions as well as the tools necessary to do so.
- COPE provides students with opportunities to learn how to identify and label their emotions as well as how to cope with these feelings.
- Through COPE, each classroom in grades kindergarten through fifth grade in Bernards Township gained access to a COPE kit. 144 kits total.
- Children have access to emotion cards that will assist in emotion identification and coping cards to assist in managing these emotions (i.e., take a deep breath, count to ten, draw a picture, use a fidget, go for a mindful walk in the hallway, think of a happy thought, etc.).
- This coping kit includes coping cards, coloring paper, crayons, and a variety of sensory tools to be used when a child is experiencing a heightened emotion within the classroom.
- COPE also provided each Elementary School Counselor with 40 new Social and Emotional Learning related books.
- In Year 2 the focus was to purchase curriculum off Teachers Pay Teachers to focus on the school counselors. Curriculum examples included grief counseling, problem solving and conflict resolution, diversity and tolerance, self-esteem, and cognitive behavioral therapy. -
